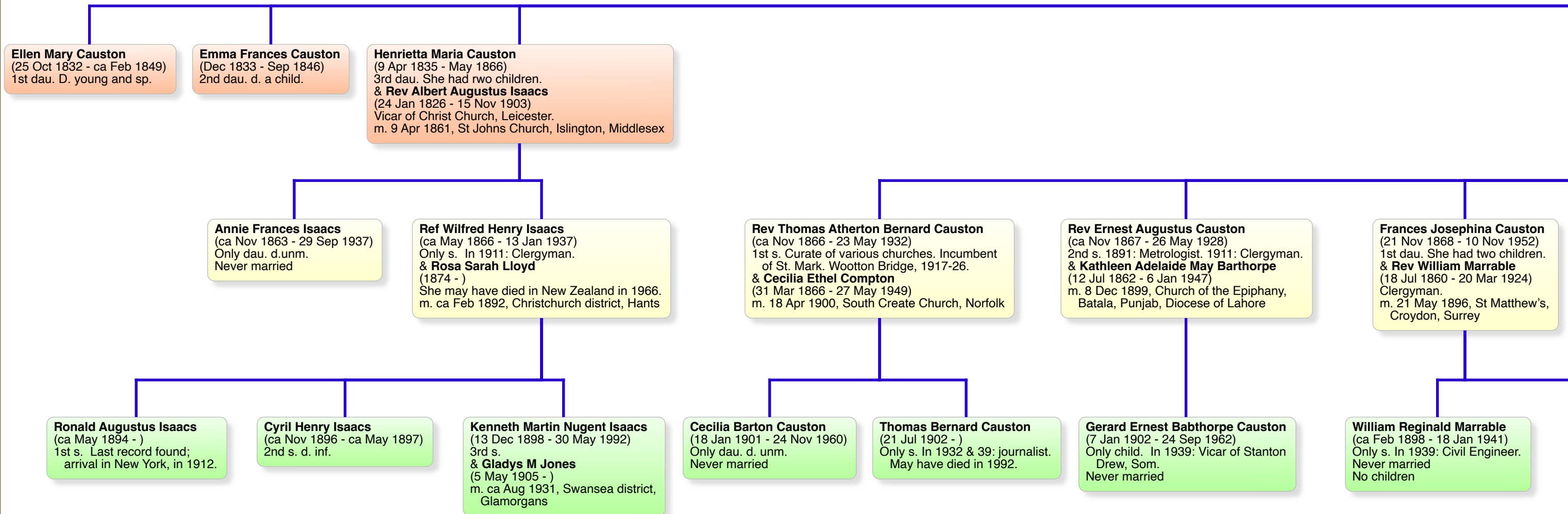


Designed to be printed on A3 paper:

misgivings and other comments will be warmly appreciated.

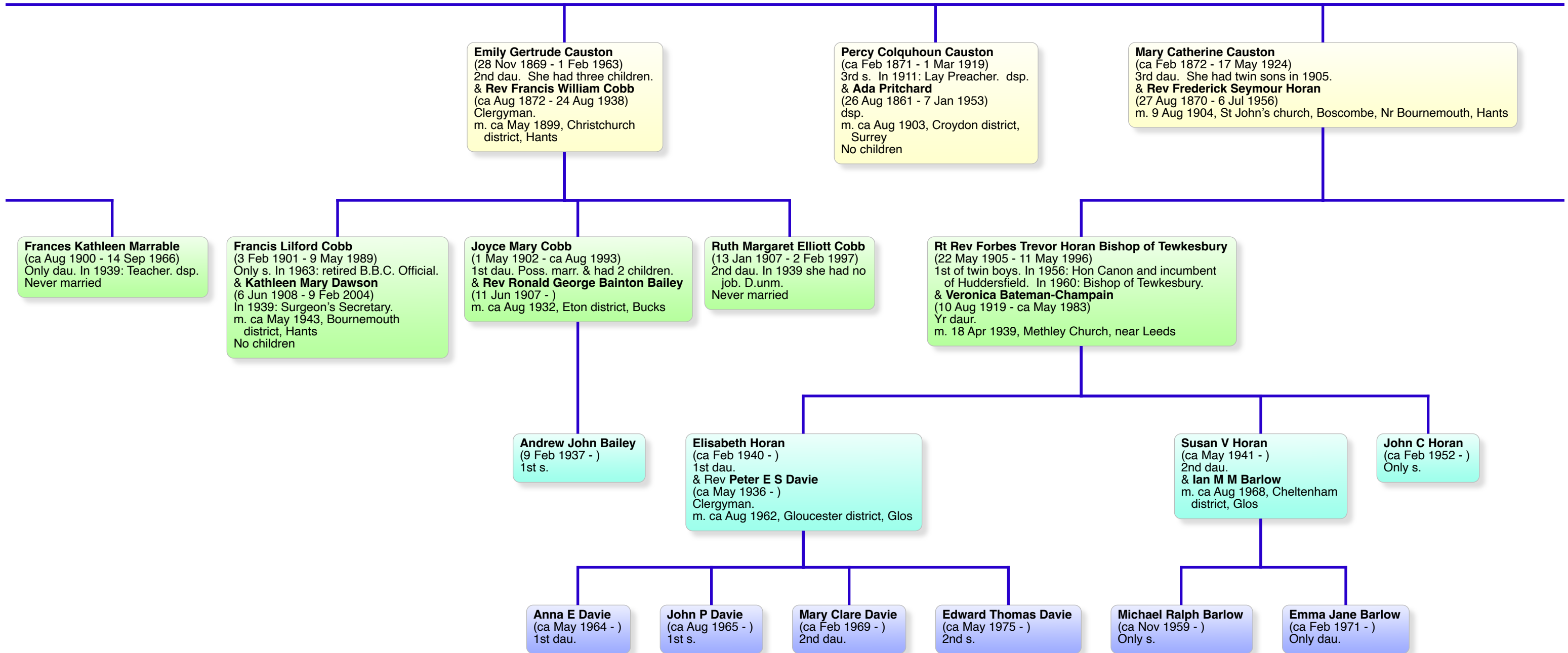
Records in Other Countries

Britain is superb for the quality and availability of vital
records for births, marriages and deaths.

So far there has been no suggestion that British records
of living people should be hidden.

But other countries do not keep, let alone make available
quite so many records. For poorer countries it is an
expense they cannot afford, though the Irish Government
sees it as an expense to promote tourism back to their
homeland.

Many Caustons, and many Powyses, went to South Africa
and it is very difficult to find out anything about them.
This can be seen in the this chart.
