


Notes

If father and son have different arms, the College of Arms quarters both of them.

Heraldry did not start until c. 1150, so some of the arms found by the College of Arms were devised after, long after even, the deaths of the people concerned.

Of the 64 quarterings presented by the College of Arms, some five of them, quarters 6, 24, 33, 38 and 53, cannot in fact be quartered as we either are not descended from these chaps or not via an heiress.

It is possible that we cannot claim to the College of Arms that some of the Green arms be quartered, as the people concerned may not have had arms that the College would recognise.
